Dear Westminster Friends,

The past few months have been real eye-openers for me on both a personal and pastoral level. Some of what I have seen in the Word and in other people has caused me to do some honest self-assessment, leading to some adjustments in how I pursue discipleship and how I believe you should join me in doing so.

In one very important convergence, I was reading a book by Dallas Willard, *Renovation of the Soul* at the same time that I was invited to the Westerfield's to see a video of a presentation Willard made at a conference Tom and Shelia attended. Many things stood out, but one jarred me: we tend to go at discipleship either backwards, or missing key components.

The essence of what Willard shares is that there is a definite process of discipleship which Jesus uses and to which we are all called. This process is detailed in the acronym: VIM, or Vision, Intent and Means. Vision is hearing a call to be a disciple of Jesus (being invited to something great). Intent is choosing to answer that call with passion (making a decision to take Jesus up on his offer to be our Master). Means are those instruments by which discipleship takes place (prayer, fasting, study, solitude, service and the like).

While we may agree that all three things are components of discipleship, we usually don't approach being followers of Jesus in this way. In fact, we often jump right to the end of the triad, focusing on programs and ideas that will help us be disciples. The problem, though, should be obvious to us: we haven't caught the vision of what it truly means to be a disciple and haven't made a conscious choice to follow Jesus. These things must be done in order, or the discipleship process will fail.

As a pastor and a follower of Jesus, I have been quick to jump to the means, and equally quick to assume that the means are all you need as the congregation I serve. The fact is that it will not matter how good the programs or practices are if we have not understood or committed ourselves to be followers of Jesus as he defines us. No class or curriculum will make a lasting difference if we do not hear and choose Jesus first.

This is why I am spending this year talking to you about developing a passionate faith. You will hear me invite you into this discipleship over and over again, and each of you must make a choice to either follow Jesus as he desires or to miss out on this grand adventure.


So here's your invitation for today: let's all decide to follow Jesus with passion. It's the right place to start.

Insights into Prayer

Jesus shares some insights regarding how to pray to God in Matthew 6:5-13.



"When you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by men. I tell you the truth, they have received their reward in full. But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then, your Father who sees what is done in secret, will reward you. And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans for they think they will be heard because of their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him. This, then is how you should pray: Our Father in heaven, hallowed is your name, your kingdom come your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our debts as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one."

First Jesus shares how not to pray:

Verse 5 We are to pray in secret, not as some were doing in His day - praying out loud publicly, primarily just to be seen and heard.

Verse 6 Jesus asks us to go in a private place since our Heavenly Father already knows what we are going to pray about.

Verse 7 Jesus tells us not to ramble on and on, or to be repetitious with words. God, our heavenly Father, would have us be specific about our prayers.

Verse 8 Jesus reiterates that the believer is not to pray repetitiously like the heathen.

Next, Jesus teaches us how to pray:

Verse 9 Jesus says we should give honor to God and His name.

Verse 10 We are to pray for His kingdom to come, and for His will to be done, that there would be heavenly or godly presence here on earth.

Verse 11 We are to pray for daily provision.

Verse 12 We are to pray and ask for forgiveness for our sins, and for others who have wronged us.

Verse 13 We are to pray and ask God to keep us from being tempted, and to deliver us from Satan and his power.

The primary focus of prayer is the intent. Does the prayer honor God and exalt His name? What is the purpose behind the prayer? Is it personal gain or ambition? Do you pray for others to be blessed and encouraged? Are your prayers done in secret and in humility? Are your public prayers honoring to God or for you to be honored? Are your prayers focused on obtaining godly wisdom, counsel and direction? God is pleased with these prayers and answers them.

Prayer is essentially putting your request, concern, or issue before the Lord, and trusting Him to answer them and He always does. Sometimes He says yes, sometimes no, sometimes wait, and sometime He says I have a better way.

So let's go into the throne room of God (whether in private or in public) and talk to our heavenly Father about anything and everything knowing that He loves us and is waiting for us to come.

Evangelism: What, Why, How?

*Evangelize (dictionary definition):
to preach the gospel; to advocate a cause
with the object of making converts.*

Sounds kind of intimidating doesn't it. No wonder people aren't jumping up and down to join our evangelism team. Don't worry, I'm not recruiting for knocking on doors and bending people's ears with things that they don't want to hear. But since the Bible does implore us to share our faith with others, let's talk about something I'll call "passive evangelism".

Consider the story of a young man who has made headlines over and over for the past several months: Tim Tebow. Throughout his college career with the Florida Gators, Tim was open about his faith in Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior. He had "John 3:16" inscribed in his eye-black for the 2009 BCS championship game prompting 92 million web searches for that scripture. Last month, when Tebow led the Denver Broncos to victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in the AFC wildcard playoff game, there were some interesting statistics involved. Tim passed for "316" yards for an average of "31.6" yards per

completed pass. The game was the most watched wildcard game since 1988 with a last quarter overnight TV rating of "31.6". Ben Roethlisberger threw the only interception in the game on- you guessed it- a "3rd and 16" play. All coincidental numbers I'm sure; but once again, "John 3:16" was the most-searched phrase on the internet, with more than 8000 searchers clicking further to the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association's website peacewithgod.jesus.net, and 150 of those expressing a decision to follow Christ.

Well that all made for an interesting story, but I would now like to make one point. Tim Tebow, to my knowledge, **has never told a reporter or fans that they should give their lives to Christ.** He simply expresses his love and gratitude for Jesus' love for us and lets the Holy Spirit take it from there.

None of us have a platform like Tim Tebow has, but God has placed each of us in our own circle of contacts. We don't have to force Him down anyone's throat, just be available and willing to share what the Lord is in our life. Now that's evangelism!

The Quiet of Selah

Selah, a term fraught with mystery, offers a rich reference point to focus our gaze in worship. The word is used little elsewhere, so when we notice it in the Psalms and the benedictions of prophets, it may inform us of God's beckoning to the Presence. It seems that Selah is used to indicate a place where the voices are quieted and instruments resound, or to signify when the congregation ought to be still and listen. That neither ancient commentary, nor other language cues provide specific definition suggests that it might have been used to denote a pause during the Temple song, concealed by the very holiness it brings to bear.

When we come together for worship each week, do we approach the

presence of God and one another with this degree of devotion and awe? I must confess that I do not. It is enough to get myself together, all my children dressed and fed, and arrive to the church on time! While it is beautifully refreshing to be with you each Sunday—singing, praying and hearing the Word expounded — I need to be in a rhythm of practicing stillness, being quiet in God's presence. Some of us have done this through the Sacred Rhythms course last summer, and again during the couple of Taizé/Selah-style worship services this past year. Yet, many of us here are convinced that practicing this discipline is an essential feature of our faith, our discipleship, and our relationship with Jesus. This is why Howie and I will be offering regular times (quarterly) for this purpose: to gather together as a community—the Body of Christ—to sing psalms and spiritual songs, to

pray, and to be silent. It is in the silence that God spoke to Isaiah. It is in the quietness that we hear.

Another marker of the word Selah is that of 'forever.' So, to be caught up in the pause, the rest after acclaiming our Holy God, and to sit in that eternal moment...ahh. Selah.

DISCIPLESHIP By Tom Westerfield

In a previous article, I wrote about the need to be willing to share our burdens with our fellow Christians. There is another, sometimes dark, side to this subject; our response to the sharing of a need.

If you have had cause to be the person whom others try to help, you may understand the problem. By the time we come to recognize that our need is so great that we must ask for help, we are exhausted by the struggle up to this point. We now face the task of repeating the explanations over and over for each person that comes to offer aid. We are fatigued to begin with, and now the effort to interact with our potential helpers is a further drain on our weakened resources of time and energy. It becomes clearer why one would hesitate to ask for help.

How then shall we live, those of us who are called to be the helpers? The first temptation to be resisted is to demand an immediate and detailed explanation of the problem. The person to be helped should not have to repeat the same explanation over and over for each friend. They are already exhausted, and we are supposed to bring help, not greater load. We

should be willing to simply listen to the request for assistance and start work on providing that assistance. The second temptation is to believe that we know better than the person requesting what assistance is needed. We might indeed be that wise, but pushing unasked-for assistance on a person to pump-up our own sense of wisdom or power is not a reflection of anything Christlike. If the needed assistance is larger scale or complex, we need to be willing to work as part of a team to provide the needed help, which includes respecting the team leadership and being willing to accept whatever role we are assigned (assuming that we are competent to carry out that role. If we are not competent, or at least very un-confident, we need to be honest with the team and raise the issue early, as well as being willing to accept instruction or training that will make us competent.)

I have only scratched the surface of the issues here, but it should be obvious by now that this business of sharing each others' burdens requires agape love, as well as a surprising amount of dull administrative process to provide that organization necessary to ensure timely and full service for those in need. May we be ready, willing and able when the call comes!

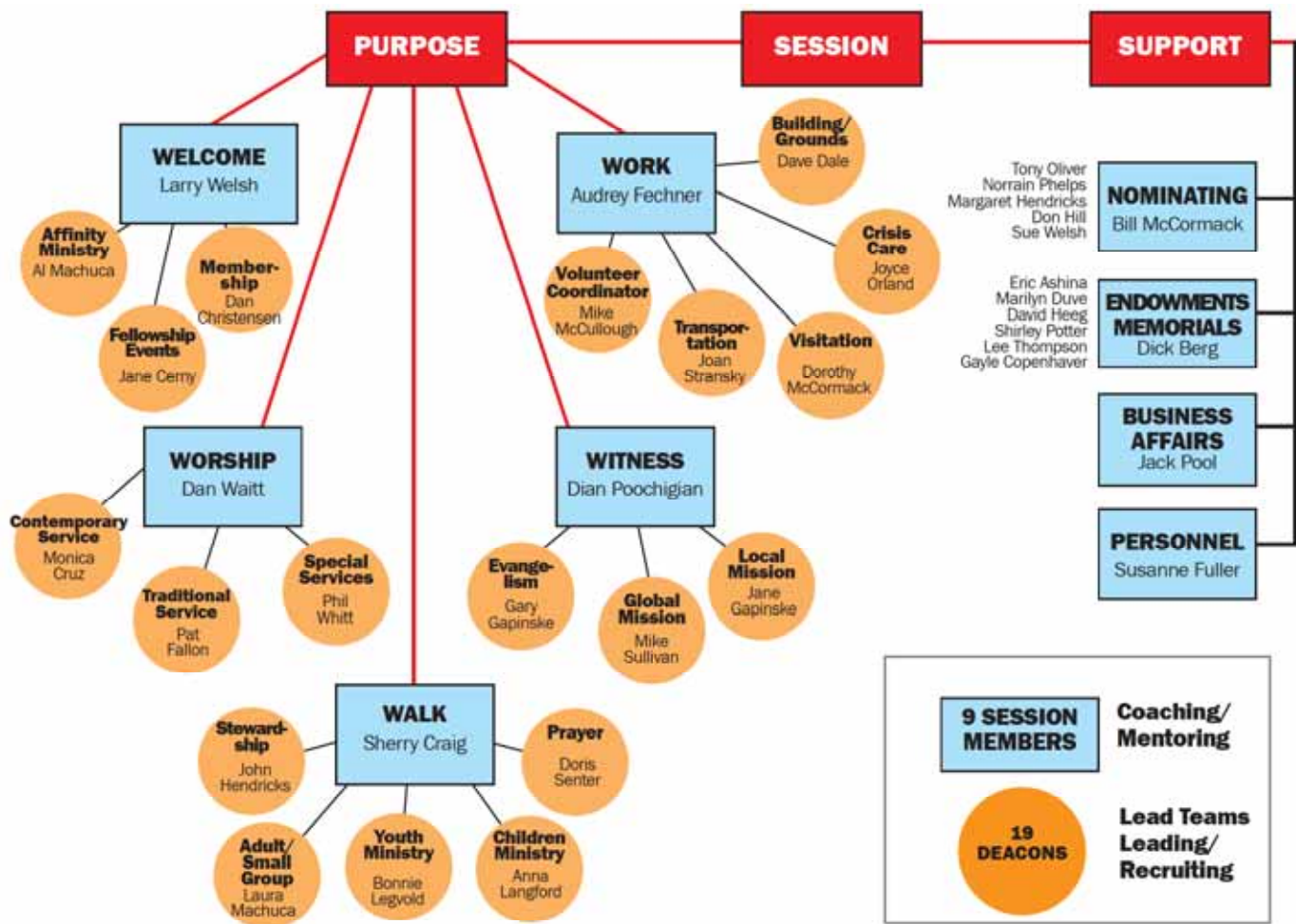

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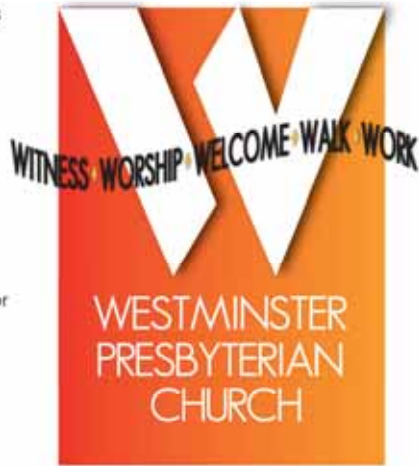
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
